Keywords

<u>Quilt</u>: a bed cover made of two layers of cloth with a filling of wool, cotton, or down, held together by patterned stitching

Portrait: a picture of a person, usually showing the person's face

Pattern: a repeating arrangement of numbers, colors or shapes
